#### Pupils Questionnaire

The pupil questionnaire was distributed to children in P5-7. The more important issue is what we do with what the results have told us. Therefore, in summary:

- Our significant investment in the AR project has been beneficial
- Children indicated that they still choose to read a range of AR and non AR books
- Within school we have centralised our AR stock in the KS2 library. Although
  children indicated that there are a wide range of books available, we need to
  purchase some additional books, particularly at the lower and upper ends of the
  levels.

#### Parent Survey

The parent questionnaire was distributed to parents of children in P5-7 only, as these children had all being using AR for at least one year. We were delighted with the 73% response. Thank you!

- The responses from parents indicate that generally children are more enthusiastic about the programme than their parents, although only 6% of parents indicated that they 'disliked it'.
- AR is designed to motivate children to read and develop their comprehension, therefore encourages children to read carefully and accurately rather than 'speed reading', hence points for questions answered correctly rather than number of books read. We remain committed to this being an important aspect of developing children's reading skills.
- We will look at the possibility of offering incentives for the number of books read, in addition to quizzes ('Word Millionaires').
- We do recognise that the programme is aimed at encouraging children who
  lack motivation to read and therefore those children who, naturally choose
  to read for enjoyment, may not be as engaged with the programme.

However, we are delighted that the children's responses indicate that they still choose a range of books and don't limit themselves to AR texts. We feel that this is very important. All children with the ability to access the programme are expected to participate in it.

- In response to this survey all classes will have dedicated class time, during
  which a child may decide to complete a quiz. In addition, we have agreed
  that a computer in each classroom will always be reserved solely for AR
  quizzes in the mornings. We do encourage children to self-manage AR to a
  degree, so they need to take some responsibility for organising themselves
  within the time slots provided.
- We have updated the link to a parent information sheet on our website and hope this answers any questions parents may have. If this doesn't answer any questions we will consider holding a further parent information session later in the school year.
- A letter has also been sent home with each child detailing how to access
  the 'parent connect' system, including their log in details so that parents
  can receive emails each time a child takes a quiz.

At the end of this document are the details of each response we received.

### Parent Comments and suggestions

Some comments have been collated if they were similar

- I would like to receive e-mails about AR quiz results.
- It is difficult for the children to access a computer to complete an AR quiz.
- A lot of books in the library aren't on the AR programme so quizzes cannot be completed by the children.
- More AR books are needed for each level in school
- Children forget to take quizzes after reading an AR book; then when
  reminded it's been too long since they have read the book. They forget the
  story and as a result they don't score well in the quiz.
- Children need a lot of motivation at home to read.
- AR being part of the school day and not left to the child's initiative to complete a guiz would work better.
- Children feel rushed to read books and complete AR quizzes.
- Children only get rewarded for when they complete AR quizzes successfully not for the number of books they read.
- Limits children's reading choices to only AR books
- AR makes reading a chore
