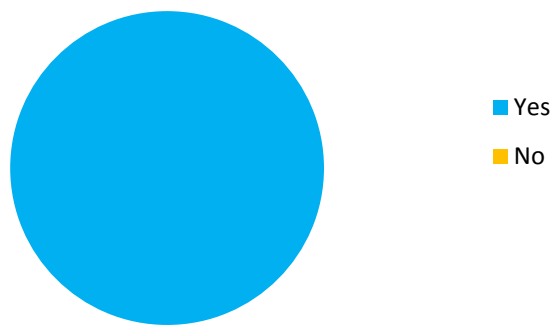

Rasharkin Primary.

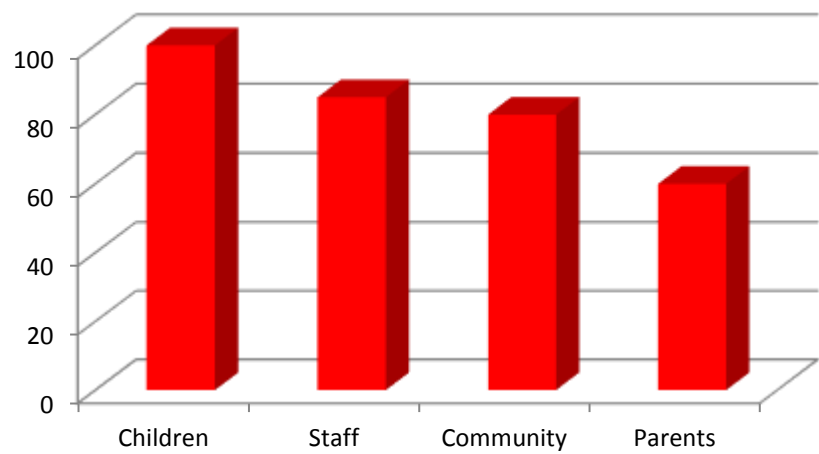

Q1. Are you familiar with the Shared Education Partnership before now (Previously CRED/EMU)?



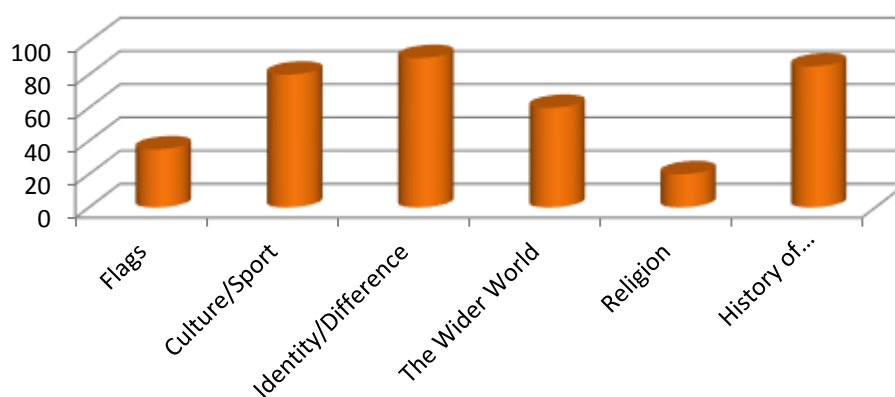
